Since the onset of the crisis, we have been working on innovative ways to cope with the unexpected impacts of COVID-19. In this statement from our CEO, Dr. Rose M. Mutiso, we summarise the actions we are taking to meet our obligations to our staff, our commitment to our beneficiaries, and to ensure our continued engagement within the regional academic and higher education ecosystem.

Among the key changes, are a postponement of our much-anticipated PhD Scholars Programme due to continued uncertainty around the re-opening of universities in East Africa, as well as changes in global philanthropy that have seen a shift in funding to COVID-19 responses. We are however excited to announce the upcoming launch of the new Mawazo Learning Exchange (MLEx), a programme which has been under development since late 2019. An outgrowth of our former 'Training and Resources Programme,' the Mawazo Learning Exchange will be a virtual professional development platform for African researchers that includes dedicated online training courses for early-career African women, covering wide range of academic and professional skills. The Mawazo Learning Exchange will also provide a growing library of resources tailored to the African context and available to researchers everywhere, regardless of their nationality or gender.

We believe that higher education has been on the cusp of a technology-enabled revolution for some time, and COVID-19 has only accelerated this transition around the world. The Mawazo Learning Exchange is our way to help ensure that African researchers are not left out of the digital migration to online learning, and we look forward to launching the site and welcoming our first cohort of MLEx Fellows in the coming months.
